


Wisconsin Net Farm Income in 2010-2018F




Wisconsin Land Values Up 2.3% in 2018

(Up 9.5% in 2017, 2nd highest in US)




Milk Prices Have Been Range-Bound





Projected Dairy Margins into 2019






Historical and Projected Margins (\$/bu) for Corn and Soybeans in Iowa (as of Jan 2019)


Wisconsin Cranberry Farm Price Down 39% since 2012




Faced with a glut of cranberries, growers could dump about 25 percent of the crop

(Sweet Corn, Snap Beans, Green Peas, Carrots, Cucumbers)




Dairy Farm Attrition Rate is up in WI






The "Long Scrape" in Dairy

- Based on farm financial data
 - A \$10 range every year in the cash costs of production on Wisconsin dairy farms
- Based on discussion with ag lenders in the state
 - 20% of farms have cash flowed right through this trough
 - 30% have had to borrow more
 - 30% have had to restructure loans
 - 20% are in real trouble



The state had a record number of suicides in 2017:


