Dear Colleagues,

When I became Assembly Minority Leader, my goal was simple: to put our caucus in the best possible position to be successful in 2018 and beyond. The past eight years have been challenging for Democrats nationally. And with the most partisan drawn legislative districts in the country, it has been even more so for Assembly Democrats.

During my time in this position I have worked to make our caucus more focused, more effective, and more intentional with our collective efforts on messaging. Together, we made progress with our floor discipline and the quality of committee work. In the building and outside of the building, I have tried to raise expectations for our caucus and have asked all of you to step up and you responded.
