Populated mostly by Native American tribes until 1820s First Europeans, French, under Jean Nicolet, 1634 Under British control, 1763-1783 Under Northwest Ordinance, 1787; separate territory in 1836 Attained statehood on May 29, 1848, 30th state

POPULATION

2010 Census: 5,686,986; a 6.0% increase over 2000

Rank: 18th among states

Native American 1.0%, Hispanic (all races) 5.9%

Median age: 38.0 years

ECONOMY

Percentage of employees in nonagricultural establishments 2014: trade, transportations and utilities: 18.4%; manufacturing: 16.3%; government, 14.5%; education and health services: 15.1%; other services: 15.6%.

Agriculture: Ranked 1st in cheese production and 2nd in milk production. Ranked 1st in corn for silage, cranberries, and snap peas for processing. Rated among the top five producers of oats, forage, potatoes, tart cherries, maple syrup, and carrots, sweet corn and green peas for processing; cucumbers for pickles; mink pelts and milk goats. Ranked 10th in farm marketing receipts. 69,000 farms, average size 210 acres, total net Wisconsin farm income was \$3.9 billion in 2013.

Manufacturing: Concentrated in southeast, Fox River Valley, and Lake Michigan west to Lake Winnebago. Value added by manufacture in Wisconsin totaled \$83.7 billion in 2013, leading the state to rank 9th. Top groups: food, machinery, fabricated metal products, and paper.

Exports: 2013 revenue from Wisconsin exports: \$23 billion. Top 10 markets: Canada, Mexico, China, Japan, Germany, United Kingdom, Australia, Brazil, Chile, and France. Top 10 categories: industrial machinery, scientific and medical instruments, electrical machinery, vehicles (not railway), plastic, paper and paperboard, iron and steel products, dairy, eggs, honey, etc.; books and newspapers, and furniture and bedding.

TRANSPORTATION

115,212 miles of road, 3,489 road miles of railroad track, 94 publicly owned airports, 8 scheduled passenger carriers. Railroad freight: 28 billion ton miles; air carriers 4.9 million passengers, 118 million tons of cargo; Great Lakes ports 39.4 million tons freight (88% at Superior). 5.7 million registered motor vehicles.

GOVERNMENT

Congress: 2 U.S. Senators, 8 U.S. Representatives

State: Constitutional officers: Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction are elected to 4-year terms. The legislature: 33-member senate, 99-member assembly. Senators serve 4 years, Representatives 2 years. Meets in January, odd-numbered years for 2-year session. Judiciary consists of circuit courts, court of appeals, supreme court. Circuit and appeals judges elected to 6-year terms, supreme court justices for 10 years, on nonpartisan ballot.

Local: 72 counties, 190 cities, 407 villages, 1,255 towns, 447 school districts, 16 technical college districts can levy taxes. Counties elect board supervisors, and may elect or appoint an executive. Cities elect either a mayor and common council, or operate under a councilmanager system. Villages elect board and board president or operate under a village manager chosen by the elected board. Towns elect 3- or 5-member town board and the board may appoint a town administrator.

EDUCATION

447 school districts serve over 870,000 K-12 students. Districts elect a school board. Private schools enroll 123,104 students. UW System: 13 universities, 13 2-year colleges enroll 180,979 students, governed by an appointed board of regents. 29 private colleges and universities enroll 65,363 students. Technical College System serves 326,544 students in 16 districts, governed by a state board and district boards.

RECREATION

15,074 lakes, 13,000 miles of trout streams, 6 million acres of hunting lands. State issues over 665,000 hunting and 707,000 fishing licenses per year; registers 614,452 boats, 236,248 snowmobiles, and 298,857 ATV's; operates 49 state parks, 14 state forests, 8 recreation areas, and 36 state trails.
