Thank you for the information. I will look into this.

Regarding this paragraph:

"We'll also want to spend some time with vendor asking a lot of technical questions about implementation, such as what is required on the client side, are there APIs to access the data? If this is going to be the database of record for polling places, we need to be able to access the data for website updates, interactive polling place maps, and open data. We will also need to explore the Clerk's need for feeding data to Munis and how the vendor would be able to support this business need."

I thought you had asked some of these questions in the virtual meetings you attended with our office and the MODUS folks. They could alter their system, for added costs, to allow a smoother export for Munis, but we had decided that we were able to adapt whatever the current export is in a way that we can import the data to Munis. There is also not going to be a public-facing database of polling place with MODUS. We are utilizing ArcGIS and Revote for this already. The listing of polling places for MODUS are for scheduling polling place and allocation of equipment and routing that equipment.

I will follow-up with MODUS, work with Purchasing, and we will look to get something in 2021.

Thanks for checking in on your request.

Given the cost is nearly \$30k / year, this means, usually, that there needs to be other competitive quotes. This is based off of Purchasing's guidelines document found on their page at

https://www.cityofmadison.com/employeenet/finance/purchasing#guide. You will need to work with Purchasing. They will be able to guide you through the process.

Once you know who the vendor is, you will need to submit a "New Software Request" form. The New Software Request Process (APM 3-20 pdf) applies to all software and online services, including free software. Approval is required for all software, including downloaded, web-based and equipment embedded with software on City-owned devices, regardless of price.

The Purchasing Guidelines apply to all software purchases and must be followed. City Attorney and Risk review are required because software and online services come with a set of legal terms (sometimes known as an End User License Agreement or EULA). The EULA is a contract. City staff are not authorized to sign, click or agree to any legal terms, even for free software.

We'll also want to spend some time with vendor asking a lot of technical questions about implementation, such as what is required on the client side, are there APIs to access the data? If this is going to be the database of record for polling places, we need to be able to access the data for website updates, interactive polling place maps, and open data. We will also need to explore the Clerk's need for feeding data to Munis and how the vendor would be able to support this business need.

The documentation provided that you provided for the Modus software is, very dated (old), although the document metadata indicates it was created in November of 2019. We are hoping that there is updated documentation because at first glance, the Standard Agreement document mentions a minimum operating system of Windows XP, and needing to allow Silverlight. Windows XP went end-of-life in April 2014. This is of concern that a vendor would be mentioning they support such outdated operating system. Silverlight went end-of-life on October 12th of this year, and it only works on IE, which is also ending.

The vendor mentions that they are working towards a new version with a target date of 4th quarter 2020. We are concerned that they were not there at least a year ago. When Dave Faust looked at their website, he was unable to find any information related to their technical architecture which is another concern about their viability as a vendor.

There are both procurement and technical challenges that need to be met. Because of those, implementing in 2020 will not occur.

I think, at a minimum, we need updated technical architecture specifications from Modus. Please reach out to them to ask for updated technical architecture specifications.

I wanted to follow-up on this, now that the election is (somewhat) in our rear-view mirror and we are able to breathe a little. To answer the below items:

- 1. I believe we have budgeted for a \$30,000 subscription fee that MODUS had priced for us.
- 2. In late January, I had filled out a project request form (<u>Project Request Form</u>), is this the same thing?
- 3. Rodney, if you recall, we put together a listing of priorities in election management software. I think this was compiled and sent around in May. I attached a copy to the email.

We ran into numerous situations in this last election, where we were failed by our current system that uses multiple spreadsheets and databases that do not sync together. None of these failures were critical, but they easily could have been had we not caught them at the last minute.

We have an opportunity to use some of our Center for Tech and Civic Life grant money to pay for

installation and a pro-rated subscription fee for the remainder of 2020, in order to get everything up and running and for us to be trained before the February 16, 2020 election. Is this something that would be feasible? I have included the three documents from MODUS regarding the possibility of moving forward on this. Please let me know if I have missed anything.

My understanding of looking at the MODUS software was to get some ideas of what we wanted in a software for handling election workflows for the city. To move on to building something is premature. I believe our next steps as a team needs to be that we assess what is really needed and where we want to go from here:

- 1) Need to find out the clerk's office available budget? Do we have something for 2020, 2021, 2022, etc??? Determine how much we have, which budget is it in, and what team is paying for the software.
- 2) Fill out the APM 3-20 Software Acquisition form. Whether we build or buy, this procedure must be followed
- 3) Create a list of election requirements we need the software to accommodate. We need to make sure that whatever we obtain, meets all your business needs and makes your work easier.

At a minimum, we need to complete steps 1 and 2, so we can come up with a schedule to move this forward. Most of these tasks require time from decision makers and subject matter experts in the clerk's office. I can make myself available to help work through these steps, just let me know.

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

So what's the deal with Recounts?

As counting continues, it's becoming clear that a few states have particularly close margins in the presidential election. At this point, it appears likely that recounts could take place in Wisconsin and Georgia. Here are three top lines to keep in mind and we'll follow up with more information as things become clearer.

- 1. Recounts are pretty common in elections. We saw recounts in both 2018 and 2016.
- 2. Each state has different laws governing how recounts work.
- 3. Recounts are in some ways a security feature to ensure that every vote

was counted and every voice was heard.

We know there's a lot of noise online about this election, but it's important to remember that it was a huge success thanks to the hard work of election officials.

Americans voted in record numbers and thanks to early voting, we saw fewer lines and issues at the polls on election day. Thank you to everyone who helped make that happen.

We will continue to keep you informed as the count continues and votes get certified.

Good afternoon.

I wanted to follow-up on this, now that the election is (somewhat) in our rear-view mirror and we are able to breathe a little. To answer the below items:

- 1. I believe we have budgeted for a \$30,000 subscription fee that MODUS had priced for us.
- 2. In late January, I had filled out a project request form (<u>Project Request Form</u>), is this the same thing?
- 3. Rodney, if you recall, we put together a listing of priorities in election management software. I think this was compiled and sent around in May. I attached a copy to the email.

We ran into numerous situations in this last election, where we were failed by our current system that uses multiple spreadsheets and databases that do not sync together. None of these failures were critical, but they easily could have been had we not caught them at the last minute.

We have an opportunity to use some of our Center for Tech and Civic Life grant money to pay for installation and a pro-rated subscription fee for the remainder of 2020, in order to get everything up and running and for us to be trained before the February 16, 2020 election. Is this something that would be feasible? I have included the three documents from MODUS regarding the possibility of moving forward on this. Please let me know if I have missed anything.

My understanding of looking at the MODUS software was to get some ideas of what we wanted in a software for handling election workflows for the city. To move on to building something is premature. I believe our next steps as a team needs to be that we assess what is really needed and where we want to go from here:

- 1) Need to find out the clerk's office available budget? Do we have something for 2020, 2021, 2022, etc??? Determine how much we have, which budget is it in, and what team is paying for the software.
- 2) Fill out the APM 3-20 Software Acquisition form. Whether we build or buy, this procedure must be followed.
- 3) Create a list of election requirements we need the software to accommodate. We need to make sure that whatever we obtain, meets all your business needs and makes your work easier.

At a minimum, we need to complete steps 1 and 2, so we can come up with a schedule to move this forward. Most of these tasks require time from decision makers and subject matter experts in the clerk's office. I can make myself available to help work through these steps, just let me know.

It's Thursday night, and like every American, we're patiently waiting for election officials to finish counting votes. It's worth reminding everyone that while we all want to know the unofficial results, it takes time and we must respect the process.

As our wait goes on, however, we are seeing more and more

misinformation and disinformation. We are live factchecking with our partners at Ideas42 and you can get in on the action by clicking here.

However, there are some important things we want to clarify with you, and all voters, tonight. Here they are.

Poll watching is a time-honored part of American elections, and the practice facilitates transparency in free and fair elections. Nearly all states have rules governing how many poll watchers may participate, and how far they must be from official election operations to maintain the privacy and security of voter information. While some poll watching rules have changed slightly to maintain healthy working environments during the pandemic, election officials have provided additional transparency measures like <u>livestreams</u> and increased press conferences to ensure Americans have access to the ballot counting process.

Voting by mail has not been partisan, according to <u>research</u> conducted as recently as this spring at Stanford University and others. Misinformation about the process over the summer and fall has unfortunately sewn doubt in the process with some voters, but voters have historically used mail ballots to elect candidates of both parties in states across the political spectrum including Washington, Utah, Colorado and more.

There are many security features built into the mail ballot process that give voters confidence that their vote will be counted. Most state election administrators offer information about these security features including signature verification, individualized barcoding, postmarks to show time of delivery, and more.

Ultimately, voters deserve to have options to vote safely and securely. It is important that Americans get the most accurate information possible about voting methods available to them. Election officials have provided transparency

throughout the day with frequent press conferences and readily updated data. We continue to look to them for the latest as they count every vote.

It's been a long few days, and it's not over yet. Our team will be hard at work bringing Americans the information and facts they need until every ballot is counted and this election is certified.

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
It's been another busy day for Election Officials around the country as they process ballots during this unprecedented election cycle.

- 1. Most importantly, look to your local county election officials who are the most trusted source of information.



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We are still a long way from knowing the outcome of races across the country. But here's a quick update on some of the things happening on the ground.

1. The states that mailed ballots to all voters this election (CO, OR, WA, CA, HI, VT, DC, NJ) saw incredible voter turn out. It shows what we've been saying for years which is when you give voters more options to participate, they turn out.

2. Huge turnout seems the theme of the night. Just look at how many states have joined our "100 Club" this afternoon!



- 3. Ballot Processing is going really well across the country. Even in states where access to vote-at-home options weren't as extensive, and that have restrictive pre-processing laws, election officials are hustling to process their vote-at-home ballots quickly and accurately. For example, Michigan is reporting 92% of early vote-at-home ballots having been processed. There is a strong possibility of ongoing litigation across the country, so we will need to continue monitoring this closely.
- 4. Election Day wait times and polling place lines were greatly reduced because of record early voting numbers, enabling polling places to maintain safe, socially distanced voting.







We've already discussed that election results will take longer this year because of restrictive state laws that limit ballot processing in a handful of states (perhaps not the ones you expect!). However, It's important to remind everyone — voters, journalists and political leaders — that the way we call races needs to change too.

As you start to see early vote totals and results tomorrow night, it's important to remember that provisional ballots are always counted last. These provisional ballots serve as a final security stop gap to ensure no double voting or other mishaps have occurred. Many experts believe there will be more than usual this


year from voters who requested an absentee ballot but chose to vote in person.

A strong vote at home system requires more than just sending voters a ballot. It also requires election offices to provide multiple ways for ballots to be returned. With the election just one week away, a quick review of how ballots can be returned and what that means for voter engagement is something worth revisiting.





Let me know if WisVote gets slow again. I'm more than willing to contact the WEC about that again if there's an issue. It'd also help if you all reported it too, so they don't tell me that they're not hearing that from anyone else.

And I wanted to let you know that I asked the WEC about their processing of absentee ballot requests. They said they're caught up. Request forms are still trickling in and they're able to get them entered into WisVote in real time. They did mention that about half of the requests they received were either duplicate absentee ballot requests or incomplete requests. So one thought I had is that maybe some of the people thinking their absentee ballot request is being slow to be fulfilled is that they sent in an incomplete request. Another is that there could be delays in the mail, so it could take their request forms longer than they think to get back to the WEC.

Thank you for all that you're doing. I know things are insanely busy right now.

Hello Anjali & Sam,

Thank you for the offer. All of our ExpressVote machines have water resistance covers.

We have not yet had any challenges with the rain, however we will not endanger the lives of our election officials and make them stand out in the middle of a storm with the potential to be hit by lightning.

As nice as it is to have observers, sometimes they do not understand the process. The pinch point was and is the WisVote servers which were absurdly slow on Tuesday and only resolved later on. Maybe you could encourage the WEC to hire more staff to process their absentee mailers and expand their overall server capacity.

Also, the libraries themselves limit our staffing capacity. You might be aware, Milwaukee attempted to open at Miller Park and Fiserv Arena but state statutes limits us to the number of locations publically noticed and passed by our Common Council in June. We cannot legally add any locations for this election.

Additionally, it is a General Election where there is always a great volume of voters. Sometimes voters who don't turn out frequently can be faced with a ballot where there are races they might be unfamiliar with and take more time which is perfectly alright. We are

there to support voters. Perhaps you could help with voter education and outreach. As you well know, LWV has a great VOTE411 platform!

Dear Clerks and Administrators,

A word of congratulations on the eve of Early Voting. More than 60% of mail ballots in Wisconsin have already come back, and I know you're all pretty close to that figure, or ahead of it. The other states I've been tracking aren't doing nearly that well. The early return rate puts you in better shape to complete your mail ballot tally in a timely way on Election Night.

Also a word of caution. I've attached a copy of a press release from Los Angeles Co., where an arsonist apparently attacked a ballot drop box last night. You may want to forward this to your police department and consider asking for additional patrols past your boxes, if it seems locally appropriate. You might also consider a release or social media post emphasizing your security camera coverage to deter copycats.

States where Early Voting began today saw long lines at the opening bell. My local site still had a line of 150+ people waiting at 1:00 pm when my wife went to put her ballot in the drop box there. Good afternoon.

Here are the highlights from this past week in the City Clerk's Office.

- **Current Priority: In-Person Absentee Voting Preparations** We are piecing together a schedule for staffing our In-Person Absentee Voting (IPAV) sites. Sixty-eight percent of our IPAV workers have only been available for remote work during the pandemic, but we find a way to make things work.
- * Absentee Mailings We have issued 97,637 absentee ballots, of which 60,138 have been returned to be counted. We had 10,518 absentee ballots returned this past week.
- ★ Voter Registration We currently have 188,493 registered voters. We have had 24,598 voters register or update their registration since the August Primary, including 3,843 this past week.
- ★ Polling Place Search UW-Madison has decided which of its buildings we can use on Election Day, so we are all set with polling locations, other than finding a replacement for the Madison Ice Arena. Next week we will begin mailing postcards to voters whose polling location has moved since April.
- ★ Election Official Training On Tuesday, we offered the first of four live webinars for the Presidential Election. We have also scheduled 50 Zoom sessions for Beginner training, and two Zoom sessions for Chief Inspector training.
- ★ Election Day Supply Totes This weekend and next weekend, a group of college student poll workers will help prepare the supply totes for Election Day. This is the most dreaded, back-breaking task in the Clerk's Office, so we are spreading out the work over four weekend afternoons.
- **★ Looking Ahead** Voter registration closes on Wednesday.

Hello Anjali & Erin,

We are encouraging voters to return their absentees as soon as possible which gives us time to follow up with voters in case there is something missing. We are receiving thousands of absentees daily and they are checked at 5 different stops for the:

- 1) Voter's signature
- 2) Witness's signature
- 3) Witness's address

before they even go into the holding box for that ward. We call or email the voter if their witness address is missing. We otherwise mail their absentee ballot back within approx. 1 day of receiving it along with a letter explaining how they can fix it.

What exactly did the other municipality need help with? Because we check the absentees 5 times before they even go into the secured box for the ward, we hope to reduce rejection rates. If voters are dropping off their absentees curbside on election day, election officials can help a voter cure right then and there. When a voter returns or requests absentees in that short period before the election, that abbreviates the time we have to help.





An Update from the Milwaukee Election Commission Thanks for signing up to be an Inspector. We've got hundreds of new recruits, so you're joining a full team. We're focusing today on Covid-19 safety. Learning how we've prepared can help you feel comfortable with your role, knowing that you're part of a safe team.
Mail Voters & You One big factor making election day easier, and healthier, is that about 100,000 Milwaukee voters, have already requested mail ballots. Each is someone you won't have to check in. Remind friends and family who are voting by mail to sign their ballot envelope and get a witness to sign as well. If voters fail to complete the certifications, they can vote on Election Day.
Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

We're providing a full set of PPE including a mask and face shield for every inspector. We will have plexiglass barriers at receivers and registrar tables, keeping your air space separate from the voters. We also provide gloves, hand sanitizer and surface disinfectant.

We will issue enough pens that each voter can mark their ballot with a fresh one, to avoid contact transmission. And we will have masks for any voter without one.

Social Distancing in the Polling Place
To help voters practice social distancing, we are providing floor tape for 6-foot markings, and a 6-foot length of string to measure it out. Every site will have a greeter overseeing the line, reminding voters to have ID ready and identifying those who have come to the wrong place, so their stay at the receivers or registrar table is short.

As an option for providing additional separation for vulnerable, sick or mask-less voters, you can offer Curbside Voting using procedures in the Election Day Manual.

Thanks again for joining us for this historic election. Please pick up your manual and take your training. To receive payment, you must provide a copy of your Social Security card and complete the Employee Information Sheet.


Poll Watchers

Aha! We steer away from using the term "ID" to refer to proof of address, which is only needed when registering to vote. I try to avoid mentioning proof of address when talking about voter ID because voters and poll workers easily confuse the two.

Once a voter is registered at their current address, they don't need to worry about proving their address again. However, many voters stay home from the polls because they wrongly assume that an outdated address on their ID will keep them from voting.

I also worry that voters who have a WI ID that does not meet the Federal REAL ID requirements will wrongly assume that they can't vote. Their WI ID/license does not need to meet the Federal REAL ID requirements. If the DMV told them that their ID is "non-compliant," they can still use the ID to vote. If their WI ID says "Not valid for federal purposes," that has nothing to do with federal elections, and they can still use their ID to vote.





Hi Maribeth,

I spoke with Bonnie at length over the past couple of days. She's been incredibly helpful in clarifying the process of preparing for elections and laying out the resources that Madison has access to. I understand that you both have been in contact with our City Clerk about these options but seem to have run into some roadblocks.

As you probably know, Alder Krause and I are looking to have another conversation with the clerk today. While we always seek to work with City staff to come up with solutions, the top priority is serving the needs of our residents and making voting in our district as accessible as possible. We plan to introduce a resolution to the council to either change our polling place, share one with Madison, or both. Based on my conversations with Bonnie, it looks like we can make some changes happen and put resources into it, both from Madison and the League of Women Voters.

To make a stronger case, I would like to put these support mechanisms (poll workers, staff assistance, equipment, shared space) in writing, both for the council and the public to see and weigh in on. Would your office be willing to write a letter of support for and possibly speak at our Council meeting next week? The biggest priorities are a) making the Redeemer City polling place accessible for voting in November b) considering a shared polling location at the Boys & Girls Club Allied Family Center or c) both.

Dorothy and I are talking with Tracy at 3pm, so we will see what the outcome of the conversation is. I would be glad to have a conversation about this over the phone and see what is possible. If we introduce a resolution, I believe the deadline is Friday at noon (I need to check though to make sure that the holiday weekend does not push up the deadline).

Thank you both for your support, advocacy, and all the work you put in, particularly this year during COVID-19.

Additionally, given all the concerns voters have about putting their ballots in the mail, we will be holding a Democracy in the Park event citywide from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, September 26, and on Saturday, October 3, with Sundays available as rain dates. We will have at least two poll workers stationed in every one of our 206 city parks, available to register voters and serve as a witness for voters dropping off their absentee ballots. Voters will be able to identify the poll workers by their high visibility City of Madison safety vests and Vote yard signs.

Another idea from a Brennan Center call earlier today is to promote Monday, October 19, as "Mail It Back Monday" so voters aren't waiting until the last minute to mail back their absentees.

Our next project is to figure out how to make a frame for social media so our poll workers can use a Madison Election Official frame on Facebook. The idea is to let their friends know that the election is being administered by someone they know and trust, and to help recruit additional poll workers.

Maggie,

It may be worth talking about some of these issues if you like. In the meantime, here are some thoughts that can get you started.

First, I've attached a preview copy of our Guide to Ballot Drop Boxes. It'll be fancied up in the next few days, and I notice that for instance, one photo failed to display when I transferred this from our Google docs drive to a Word document. But relatively little of substance will change. We'll send you a final copy as well.

There is a lot of discussion of ballot retrieval starting with a checklist on p. 20 and narrative on p. 21. You'll see that we do recommend daily pick-up, by teams of two people. We also recommend bipartisan teams. And we recommend documentation of each box opening, possibly including a cell-phone photo, which can provide a time-stamp as well as proof the box was completely empty.

Retrieval teams can be employees, hourly employees, pairs of judges either from your existing pool or recruited newly for this purpose.

I want to mention one significant difference between your situation and the experience of many jurisdictions where mail is the primary voting method and drop boxes are common. If I remember, you're putting ballots in the mail 6 to 6.5 weeks before the election. By comparison, Arapahoe Co. (suburban Denver) traditionally mailed out ballots and opened boxes 22 days in advance; King Co., Washington (Seattle) opened drop boxes 18 days before their election this summer.

I can understand why you intend to send them out quite early. Both the pandemic and mail delivery problems make an early start preferable.

That decision may affect the balance between other principles of a good mail and drop-box program, such as when you make boxes available, whether you make them all available from that date, and whether you pick up daily during the entire stretch. If you like, we can

talk over some of the options with you. Colorado initially required pick-ups every 72 hours, but changed the law to require daily pick-up soon after. In addition to security and perceptions of security, this allows you to check ballots in more quickly, which can reassure voters (and prevent calls to your office.)

The other thing to keep in mind is that the ballot return curve has a long tail and a high peak. Aside from a blip when boxes open, you'll see relatively few each day until about a week before election, and from then, it will go exponential. I'm looking at a chart of daily pick-up numbers from Pierce Co., Washington, (Tacoma), where they received 168,000 ballots in their drop boxes in 2018. Half of them came in the last two days - 35,000 on Monday and 45,000 on Election Day itself.

Arapahoe Co. has had 4 teams making pick-ups once a day at 7-8 boxes each, in a county that is much more geographically dispersed than the city of Madison. I could potentially see a single team picking up from 14 boxes in a day in a more compact setting. The time at the box is just 5 minutes or so. You'll have a better idea of travel times, obviously. In the last few days before an election, Arapahoe made pick-ups twice a day, doubling the number of teams for Monday and Tuesday, with teams cycling constantly through their routes on election day. They had not always done it that way, but 4 years ago, they had a couple ballot drop boxes that were literally filled to overflow on Election Eve. Fortunately, they were notified by a staffer at one of the sites before there was any media or widespread

Your mileage may vary, but it will be important to keep an eye on how the numbers are trending, on the capacity of your boxes, and the capacity of your retrieval teams to ramp up their number of pick-ups.

Election Day closing of drop-boxes is more staff-intensive, because you must close them all at the same time, so you'll need 14 teams. Many jurisdictions recruit staff from other, non-elections departments. This is not a difficult procedure, so outside staff can easily be trained, and since they're only closing a single box, it's not a big time-commitment. If you have sealed ballot bags for transport, the fact that you may not have bipartisan teams shouldn't be a challenge to transparency, because the process takes place at a scheduled time, it can be observed by partisan observers, and the seal should proof the bag for secure return to your office/warehouse.

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





Maggie,

It may be worth talking about some of these issues if you like. In the meantime, here are some thoughts that can get you started.

First, I've attached a preview copy of our Guide to Ballot Drop Boxes. It'll be fancied up in the next few days, and I notice that for instance, one photo failed to display when I transferred this from our Google docs drive to a Word document. But relatively little of substance will change. We'll send you a final copy as well.

There is a lot of discussion of ballot retrieval starting with a checklist on p. 20 and narrative on p. 21. You'll see that we do recommend daily pick-up, by teams of two people. We also recommend bipartisan teams. And we recommend documentation of each box opening, possibly including a cell-phone photo, which can provide a time-stamp as well as proof the box was completely empty.

Retrieval teams can be employees, hourly employees, pairs of judges either from your existing pool or recruited newly for this purpose.

I want to mention one significant difference between your situation and the experience of many jurisdictions where mail is the primary voting method and drop boxes are common. If I remember, you're putting ballots in the mail 6 to 6.5 weeks before the election. By comparison, Arapahoe Co. (suburban Denver) traditionally mailed out ballots and opened boxes 22 days in advance; King Co., Washington (Seattle) opened drop boxes 18 days before their election this summer.

I can understand why you intend to send them out quite early. Both the pandemic and mail delivery problems make an early start preferable.

That decision may affect the balance between other principles of a good mail and drop-box program, such as when you make boxes available, whether you make them all available from that date, and whether you pick up daily during the entire stretch. If you like, we can talk over some of the options with you. Colorado initially required pick-ups every 72 hours, but changed the law to require daily pick-up soon after. In addition to security and perceptions of security, this allows you to check ballots in more quickly, which can reassure voters (and prevent calls to your office.)

The other thing to keep in mind is that the ballot return curve has a long tail and a high peak. Aside from a blip when boxes open, you'll see relatively few each day until about a week before election, and from then, it will go exponential. I'm looking at a chart of daily pick-up numbers from Pierce Co., Washington, (Tacoma), where they received 168,000 ballots in their drop boxes in 2018. Half of them came in the last two days - 35,000 on Monday and 45,000 on Election Day itself.

Arapahoe Co. has had 4 teams making pick-ups once a day at 7-8 boxes each, in a county that is much more geographically dispersed than the city of Madison. I could potentially see a single team picking up from 14 boxes in a day in a more compact setting. The time at the box is just 5 minutes or so. You'll have a better idea of travel times, obviously.

In the last few days before an election, Arapahoe made pick-ups twice a day, doubling the number of teams for Monday and Tuesday, with teams cycling constantly through their routes on election day. They had not always done it that way, but 4 years ago, they had a couple ballot drop boxes that were literally filled to overflow on Election Eve. Fortunately, they were notified by a staffer at one of the sites before there was any media or widespread public attention.

Your mileage may vary, but it will be important to keep an eye on how the numbers are trending, on the capacity of your boxes, and the capacity of your retrieval teams to ramp up their number of pick-ups.

Election Day closing of drop-boxes is more staff-intensive, because you must close them all at the same time, so you'll need 14 teams. Many jurisdictions recruit staff from other, non-elections departments. This is not a difficult procedure, so outside staff can easily be trained, and since they're only closing a single box, it's not a big time-commitment. If you have sealed ballot bags for transport, the fact that you may not have bipartisan teams shouldn't be a challenge to transparency, because the process takes place at a scheduled time, it can be observed by partisan observers, and the seal should proof the bag for secure return to your office/warehouse.
