Wolf Hunt in Wisconsin Exceeds Quota by 82%

After the Trump Administration delisted the gray wolf from the Endangered Species Act on January 4th, the Wisconsin DNR became statutorily required to hold an annual wolf hunting and trapping season.

The DNR had announced plans to hold the first hunting and trapping season on November 6, 2021, and stated that the timeline to put a season in place this winter was too short. The agency was sued by the conservative Wisconsin Institute for Law and Liberty on behalf of Kansas-based Hunter Nation to force a wolf hunt to occur this winter, and a Jefferson County judge ruled that the DNR needed to establish a hunting and trapping season in February. The DNR appealed, but their appeal was dismissed.

During the hastily arranged season, which lasted 3 days, kills surpassed the quotas in each of the 6 wolf management areas across the state. A Natural Resources Board

decision to issue twice as many permits as normal, and a statutory requirement to give at least 24 hours of notice to close a hunt contributed to the overage.

A spokesperson for the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission stated: "It will go down as a stark example of mismanagement, and the problems that can be expected when the state Legislature and the courts embrace special interest groups over the public as a whole."

Funding Proposed for Citizens Utility Board

Recently a joint hearing of the Senate Committee on Utilities, Technology and Telecommunication and the Assembly Committee on energy and Utilities hear a proposal to restore funding for the Citizens Utility Board (CUB. Senate Bill 47 and its Assembly companion Assembly Bill 27 would provide up to \$900,000 in funding for the CUB.

The CUB is an independent consumer advocacy organization that represents ratepayers before the Public Service Commission, courts, and the legislature. In 2009 funding was included in the budget for the CUB, and it was removed in 2015 by the Joint Finance Committee at the request of the Milwaukee Metropolitan Association of Commerce.

It is very beneficial for ratepayers to have the CUB funded, since 2006 the CUB has saved ratepayers \$3.5 billion through its advocacy.

New Vaccine from Johnson & Johnson Available Next Week

Wisconsin is expecting to receive 47,000 doses of the newly approved vaccine from Johnson & Johnson (J&J) starting next week.

The vaccine from J&J is single-dose, unlike the earlier versions produced by Pfizer and Moderna which both require booster shots. It also does not require ultra-cold storage like the Pfizer vaccine, meaning that it will be able to be shipped directly to providers in all areas of the state more easily. These qualities are expected to help providers bring the vaccine to areas of the state that have been more difficult to reach.
