Recently the Wisconsin National Guard announced that it had collected over 1 million tests for Coronavirus since April, 2020. Over the last year, over 1,700 National Guard troops have mobilized as a part of the state's COVID-19 response. As part of the redevelopment of Komatsu Mining Corporation's West Milwaukee Headquarters, proposals have been encouraged that could lead to new restaurants, hotels and a park near the ballpark.

Komatsu Mining plans to move its operations to the Harbor District in 2022, which will provide West Milwaukee with an opportunity for redevelopment. A public hearing for these concepts is scheduled for March 15.

How to Stay Warm if You Lose Heat in Your Home

With the recent, devastating news from Texas, it is good to plan ahead in case you find yourself in a situation where your heat unexpectedly goes out in the middle of winter.

Suggestions to save precious heat in such a dangerous situation include:

- Avoid opening and closing doors, and close off rooms to avoid wasting heat.
- Close blinds and curtains to reduce drafts from windows
- Seal up doors to mitigate drafts
- Bundle up in layers of winter clothing and blankets
- Eat well and stay hydrated
- Avoid using your oven as a heat source. This is a fire hazard, and gas stoves emit carbon monoxide which can be lethal if too much is emitted
- Know the signs of hypothermia: shivering, memory loss, slurred speech, exhaustion.

Although it seems like we've reached spring this week, we are likely in for more cold weather in the months ahead. If you lose power unexpectedly, it's good to have a plan for how you're going to keep warm.

10 Years after Act 10

This past week marked the 10 year anniversary of Act 10, a pivotal moment in our state's political history.

2011 Wisconsin Act 10 was a "budget repair bill" that was proposed by the then newlyinaugurated Governor Scott Walker to address a projected \$3.6 billion budget deficit. The proposal included the elimination of collective bargaining for all public employees except law enforcement and fire fighters, as well as changes to the compensation, retirement packages, health insurance, and sick leave for public sector employees. These changes had not been part of the discussion during the preceding 2010 gubernatorial campaign, and the shocking effect of such a large change to our state's historic practices resulted in weeks of protests at the State Capitol.

The last 10 years with Act 10 as law in our state have had significant effects on the way that unions have engaged with our government in Wisconsin, and union membership has dropped by 5.5% in the last ten years. Last year, 8.7% of Wisconsin workers were members of a union which is below the national average of 10.8%.

Despite the effects of Act 10 in Wisconsin, labor leaders are optimistic about the future of organized labor in Wisconsin.

Hoping to Hear from You on Bills Expanding the Retail Sale of Alcohol

Currently there are three bills that are circulating in the state legislature that would expand restaurants' ability to sell alcohol with the intention of helping buoy struggling restaurant sales. The three bills would:

- Allow takeout alcoholic drinks by the glass (SB22/AB32)
- Allow alcohol to be delivered to homes (SB57)
- Allow "curbside pickup" for alcohol sales placed over the phone or online (SB56)
