
## Early, In-Person Absentee Voting Begins for April 6 Election

## Republican Leaders Applaud Evers Administration's Vaccination Progress

Wisconsin remains one of the best states in the nation in terms of vaccine distribution, with even Republican leadership in the State Legislature, Assembly Speaker Robin Vos (R-Rochester) and Senate

Kenosha County operates a Covid-19 Vaccine Call Center. The call center is open to people who don't have access to schedule a vaccination appointment online. These people can call (262)605-6799 to speak with someone who will walk them through the appointment process, if they are eligible. The new Kenosha County Covid Vaccination Clinic site, located inside the former Shopko at 5300 52nd St., is now operational. You can use the above link to find appointment times.

## City of Racine Schedules Spring Leaf Collection

The City of Racine's Public Works Department will hold its spring leaf collection from Monday, April 5, through Friday, April 16. Residents can place leaves, yard waste and branches, no greater than 4" long and 3" in diameter, bundled with rope or twine to no greater than 2' diameter into the street gutters for collection. These materials can be placed no earlier than the day before and no later than 7 am the day of your scheduled collection dates. Leaves or yard waste in bags or containers will not be accepted, and you may not rake leaves or yard waste into alleys. For a guide to collection dates for your area, visit

## Equal Pay Day 2021 Puts Spotlight on Gender Wage Gap

It's hard to believe that in the year 2021 we are still talking about a very-real pay discrepancy between men and women, but here we are. This year, March 24 marked Equal Pay Day, the point into the current year that a woman, working full-time, year-round, must continue to work to earn what a man would have made in the previous year. Nationally, women earn \$0.82 for every dollar earned by a man; in Wisconsin, it is \$0.81 for every dollar. The gap is even greater for Black, Asian American, Latinx and Native women.

In 2019, Wisconsin women made up 48% of the state's labor force. In 2009, Wisconsin Democrats, led by my friend former State Sen. Dave Hansen (D-Green Bay), passed the Equal Pay Enforcement Act. I was proud to co-sponsor this bill, which then-Governor Doyle signed into law. The act gave workers greater access to the court system to challenge pay discrimination based on gender, age or military status. To our delight, it was working - between 2010 and 2014, Wisconsin caught up to and even performed better than the US as a whole in terms of pay gap. That changed, however, when Scott Walker and his Republican allies in the State Legislature repealed the Equal Pay Enforcement Act. In 2015, the trend toward progress in Wisconsin reversed, and the state's gender pay gap widened, falling behind the national average, where it remains today. You can find more here and here.

Transportation and Infrastructure; What's Best for Our Kids; Justice Reform and Marijuana

The Legislature's Joint Finance Committee will be holding four public hearings on the budget; three will be held in person, in different parts of the state, and one will be virtual, allowing for participation from all parts of Wisconsin. ### Local Covid Testing Options

There are a number of options locally for anyone looking to get tested. Your primary health care provider is always an option, but there are many community testing sites available, as well.

CVS Pharmacy: Drive-through testing available at CVS in Kenosha (3710 57th Ave.) and Racine (3915 Durand Ave.); advance registration required at <a href="https://www.cvs.com/minuteclinic/covid-19-testing">https://www.cvs.com/minuteclinic/covid-19-testing</a>

**Froedert South:** Drive-through testing is available to those who qualify after completing an initial phone evaluation at (262)671-7777 between 8 am and 4:30 pm Monday-Friday

**Kenosha Community Medical Center:** A drive-through testing site at the former Chase Bank, 5506 Seventh Ave., is open to patients who complete a quick registration process at <a href="https://www.kenoshachc.org/covid-19-resource-center/">https://www.kenoshachc.org/covid-19-resource-center/</a>. Testing is conducted Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 8 am to 4 pm.

Old Kenosha Fire Station No. 3: Free, drive-through testing will be offered during the following hours at the former No. 3 Fire Station, 2121 Roosevelt Rd., Kenosha: Tuesdays, 2-6 pm; Thursdays, 2-6 pm; Saturdays, 9 am - 1 pm. This testing is being offered in a partnership between locally-owned Modern Apothecary, the Wisconsin DHS, and the Kenosha Fire Department. An appointment and preregistration is strongly encouraged, with appointment times available at <a href="https://modernapothecary.10to8.com">https://modernapothecary.10to8.com</a> and registration available at <a href="https://register.covidconnect.wi.gov">https://register.covidconnect.wi.gov</a>. Anyone who lives or works in Wisconsin, ages 5 and over, can be tested.

UW System schools statewide, including Parkside, have been provided with a limited number of rapid-result Covid-19 tests. These tests provide results in 15-30 minutes. The tests are free of charge and available to the public, and you don't have to have symptoms to get a test. A positive rapid test will need to be confirmed with the regular Covid-19 test but will provide you some guidance on whether or not you need to quarantine during that period. Registration at <a href="https://www.doineedacovid19test.com">https://www.doineedacovid19test.com</a> is required. The tests are administered in De Simone Gym in the SAC on the Parkside campus Monday-Thursday, 9 am - 5 pm, and Friday, 9 am - 1 pm. Testing is expected to last at least several weeks.
