

In Spite of Republican Obstruction, Governor Evers is Able to Rescue State Access to Federal Food Aid

In a big win for the people of Wisconsin, the Evers administration this week announced a deal with the federal government that allows the state to continue receiving between \$50 and \$70 million per month in federal food aid for low-income families. The aid money was put at risk, first by Republican attempts to strip Governor Evers of his powers to address the Covid-19 pandemic and then by the state Supreme Court striking down the Governor's emergency order and mask requirement. The additional federal aid was made available to states that have an existing emergency order regarding Covid-19. Republican leaders in the Legislature could have passed legislation authorizing a new emergency order by the Governor, thereby securing the enhanced federal funds, but they refused to do so. Governor Evers and DHS Secretary Karen Timberlake put the petty partisanship aside and, acting for the good of our state, convinced the federal government to accept a pared-back emergency declaration issued by Sec. Timberlake. This means that 400,000 Wisconsin families won't see their food aid drastically cut as a result of GOP game-playing. Thank you to Governor Evers and Secretary Timberlake for being the "adults in the room" and getting things done.



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Covid Cases and Hospitalizations Continue Upward Trend, Fueled by New Variants

Wisconsin's average daily number of new Covid infections, as well as hospitalizations, continues to trend upward this week, following recent surges by our neighboring states. It's an ongoing reminder that, even for those who are fully vaccinated, now is not the time to let up on precautionary measures. In other news, the CDC and FDA announced a "pause" on the one-shot Johnson & Johnson vaccine after 6 women, out of the 6.8 million doses given, reported a rare blood clotting disorder. Officials stress that this is just a "pause" and are hopeful that it will be short-lived. Unfortunately, that means that some people who had appointments scheduled may be pushed back a little further. It's important to note that in many parts of the state, supply has begun to exceed demand, so appointments are easy to come by. We are nearing a critical point where all of those eager to get the vaccination have done so, but that isn't enough for us to reach herd immunity. If you haven't been vaccinated yet, roll up your sleeve. If you have, share your success story with those around you who might be a little hesitant. We can get there; it's so close.

Kenosha County operates a Covid-19 Vaccine Call Center. The call center is open to people who don't have access to schedule a vaccination appointment online. These people can call (262)605-6799 to speak with someone who will walk them through the appointment process, if they are eligible. The online list of Kenosha County Covid vaccine providers is still available, at http://bit.ly/KCCOVIDHub, as well. The new Kenosha County Covid Vaccination Clinic site, located inside the former Shopko at 5300 52nd St., is now operational. You can use the above link to find appointment times.

Kenosha County Public Health will hold a Covid-19 community vaccination clinic this Saturday, April 17, at Westosha Central High School in Paddock Lake. It is open to people who live, work or study in Kenosha County. Appointments are recommended. More details are available at http://ow.ly/LVgl50EmgSD.

The Grace Welcome Center in Kenosha, 2006 60th St., will be hosting a Kenosha County Health Department vaccination clinic on April 13, 20 and 27 and May 4, from 2:00 - 5:30 pm. No appointments are necessary.

FEMA Helping with Funeral Costs for Those Lost to Covid

Families who have lost loved ones to Covid-19 can now get help with funeral expenses from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Qualified applicants can receive up to \$9,000 to help offset funeral costs, including the burial plot, casket, clergy services, cremation, transfer of remains and headstone. To be eligible, the death must have occurred in the United States; the death certificate must indicate death was attributed to Covid-19; and the person applying must be a U.S. citizen, non-citizen national or qualified alien who incurred funeral expenses after January 20, 2020. Applicants are encouraged to compile as much documentation as possible; funeral costs that were paid by burial or funeral insurance, financial assistance from voluntary agencies, government agencies or other sources are not eligible under this program. The application opened up on April 12, and the program was flooded with inquiries, so please be patient. Those interested can call **844-684-6333** or go to

Constituent Lobby Days Continue, a Little Differently, in the Age of Covid

Clearly, the picture above is from a much different time. This was taken in my Capitol office a couple of years back when a group of local pharmacy students paid me a visit to discuss issues important to

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them as students and as future pharmacists. Back then, it wasn't out of the ordinary to have a large group like this gathered in my office, advocating for a bill or presenting a new idea. Big group meetings like this aren't happening today, but I'm still maintaining a schedule of constituent and group meetings to hear from the people who sent me to Madison to represent them; now, though, we are doing it virtually. The early months of a budget year are always a busy time for what are known as "Lobby Days", and this year is no different. Just in the last few weeks, my staff and I have met (virtually) with social work students; Kenosha's Congregations United to Serve Humanity (CUSH); literacy advocates; local library staff; a college student working on a school project; folks from the Racine County Human Services Department; a group of local realtors; and more. These meetings are a great way to stay in touch with the people I represent and to hear how the legislation being debated in the Capitol impacts people in the real world. I look forward to, one day, resuming in-person meetings, but for now, virtual is the next best thing.

Local Covid Testing Options

There are a number of options locally for anyone looking to get tested. Your primary health care provider is always an option, but there are many community testing sites available, as well.

CVS Pharmacy: Drive-through testing available at CVS in Kenosha (3710 57th Ave.) and Racine (3915 Durand Ave.); advance registration required at https://www.cvs.com/minuteclinic/covid-19-testing

Froedert South: Drive-through testing is available to those who qualify after completing an initial phone evaluation at (262)671-7777 between 8 am and 4:30 pm Monday-Friday

Kenosha Community Medical Center: A drive-through testing site at the former Chase Bank, 5506 Seventh Ave., is open to patients who complete a quick registration process at https://www.kenoshachc.org/covid-19-resource-center/. Testing is conducted Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 8 am to 4 pm.

Old Kenosha Fire Station No. 3: Free, drive-through testing will be offered during the following hours at the former No. 3 Fire Station, 2121 Roosevelt Rd., Kenosha: Tuesdays, 2-6 pm; Thursdays, 2-6 pm; Saturdays, 9 am - 1 pm. This testing is being offered in a partnership between locally-owned Modern Apothecary, the Wisconsin DHS, and the Kenosha Fire Department. An appointment and preregistration is strongly encouraged, with appointment times available at https://modernapothecary.10to8.com and registration available at https://register.covidconnect.wi.gov. Anyone who lives or works in Wisconsin, ages 5 and over, can be tested.

UW System schools statewide, including Parkside, have been provided with a limited number of rapid-result Covid-19 tests. These tests provide results in 15-30 minutes. The tests are free of charge and available to the public, and you don't have to have symptoms to get a test. A positive rapid test will need to be confirmed with the regular Covid-19 test but will provide you some guidance on whether or not you need to quarantine during that period. Registration at https://www.doineedacovid19test.com is required. The tests are administered in De Simone Gym in the SAC on the Parkside campus Monday-Thursday, 9 am - 5 pm, and Friday, 9 am - 1 pm. Testing is expected to last at least several weeks.
