# Kenosha's Twisted Cuisine Offers Fine Dining in a Casual Atmosphere





# Governor Evers Calls Special Session on Healthcare; Would Expand BadgerCare and Use Funds on Badly-Needed Projects Across State

With the Republicans on the Legislature's Joint Finance Committee again shooting down BadgerCare expansion and the \$1.6 billion in federal money that comes with it, Governor Evers is taking another

approach. On Wednesday, he called a Special Session of the Legislature on the issue. The bill released by the Governor's office as part of the special session would allow the state to take the full Medicaid expansion, which would result in a \$1.6 billion cost savings to the state. Under the bill, part of this savings would then be used to address more than 50 critical economic development projects around the state, including \$53 million toward the establishment of the Racine Community Health Center (RCHC). Other projects include \$200 million for broadband expansion; \$100 million toward lead lateral replacement; \$50 million in veterans housing grants; and \$2.7 million to fight the opioid and meth crises. In addition to the extra \$1.6 billion, full BadgerCare expansion would allow coverage for 90,000 more of our friends and neighbors who need it. Unfortunately, and perhaps unsurprisingly, immediately after the announcement, Republican leaders said in a joint statement that they plan to "gavel in and gavel out" of the special session without taking any action.



# Work Search Requirements for Unemployment Insurance Claimants Back in Effect; GOP Seeks to End Federal UI Benefits for Wisconsin Jobless

With many businesses still getting back on their feet from the Covid-19 pandemic, and some workers struggling to find jobs or affordable child care, the Republican majority in the Legislature took two kicks at the state's unemployed this week. On Wednesday, the Joint Committee for Review of Administrative Rules voted by party-line to reinstate a requirement that Unemployment Insurance (UI) claimans complete four work searches per week in order to receive their benefits; this mandate had been waived since early in the pandemic. The reinstated requirement begins on Sunday. Earlier in the week, Assembly Speaker Robin Vos (R-Rochester) and Joint Finance Committee Co-Chair Sen. Howard Marklein (R-Spring Green) began circulating legislation that would end federal enhanced unemployment benefits for Wisconsin jobseekers. In both instances, GOP legislators said their actions were meant to address reported struggles of employers in finding workers. However, several economists say that this worker shortage is primarily a result of trends predating the pandemic; in fact, Wisconsin's workforce participation rate is roughly the same now as it was pre-Covid shutdown. The workforce in the state, and nationwide, is flat and has been for some time, and blaming the problem on availability of unemployment benefits simply masks a need to address the underlying causes.



## \$100 Million in Federal ARPA Money

Broadband access, or lack thereof, has long been an issue in certain parts of the state. Governor Evers announced a big step forward in addressing that issue with a \$100 million allocation of federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds for grants to expand broadband access. The funds would be available through a program similar to the existing Broadband Expansion Grant Program, which helps local governments fund projects that expand internet access to unserved and underserved parts of Wisconsin. Grant applications for the ARPA money will be open June 1 and due by July 27. Wisconsin currently ranks 30th in the nation for broadband access. #### Bend and Brew Offers Free Outdoor Yoga in Racine

Downtown Racine Corporation's "Bend and Brew", a popular relaxation and meditation program, will continue through the fall, weather permitting, due to popular demand. Yoga sessions are offered on Wednesdays from 6-7 pm and Saturdays from 9-10 pm at the east end of Christopher Columbus Causeway by Reefpoint Marina. After every session, participants receive a certificate to use towards a free coffee or beer at participating businesses. Registration is not required, and sessions are led with people of all ages and skill levels in mind. The sessions are free, although a \$5 donation toward Yoga Roots Racine is appreciated. ### More than Forty Percent of State's Population Fully Vaccinated

Forty-two percent of people living in Wisconsin are fully vaccinated against Covid-19, placing Wisconsin twelfth in vaccination rate, while nearly 50% have received at least one dose.

Kenosha County operates a Covid-19 Vaccine Call Center. The call center is open to people who don't have access to schedule a vaccination appointment online. These people can call (262)605-6799 to speak with someone who will walk them through the appointment process, if they are eligible. #### Local Covid Testing Options

There are a number of options locally for anyone looking to get tested. Your primary health care provider is always an option, but there are many community testing sites available, as well.

**CVS Pharmacy:** Drive-through testing available at CVS in Kenosha (3710 57th Ave.) and Racine (3915 Durand Ave.); advance registration required at <a href="https://www.cvs.com/minuteclinic/covid-19-testing">https://www.cvs.com/minuteclinic/covid-19-testing</a>

**Froedert South:** Drive-through testing is available to those who qualify after completing an initial phone evaluation at (262)671-7777 between 8 am and 4:30 pm Monday-Friday

**Kenosha Community Medical Center:** A drive-through testing site at the former Chase Bank, 5506 Seventh Ave., is open to patients who complete a quick registration process at <a href="https://www.kenoshachc.org/covid-19-resource-center/">https://www.kenoshachc.org/covid-19-resource-center/</a>. Testing is conducted Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 8 am to 4 pm.

Old Kenosha Fire Station No. 3: Free, drive-through testing will be offered during the following hours at the former No. 3 Fire Station, 2121 Roosevelt Rd., Kenosha: Tuesdays, 2-6 pm; Thursdays, 2-6 pm; Saturdays, 9 am - 1 pm. This testing is being offered in a partnership between locally-owned Modern Apothecary, the Wisconsin DHS, and the Kenosha Fire Department. An appointment and preregistration is strongly encouraged, with appointment times available at <a href="https://modernapothecary.10to8.com">https://modernapothecary.10to8.com</a> and registration available at <a href="https://register.covidconnect.wi.gov">https://register.covidconnect.wi.gov</a>.

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Anyone who lives or works in Wisconsin, ages 5 and over, can be tested.

UW System schools statewide, including Parkside, have been provided with a limited number of rapid-result Covid-19 tests. These tests provide results in 15-30 minutes. The tests are free of charge and available to the public, and you don't have to have symptoms to get a test. A positive rapid test will need to be confirmed with the regular Covid-19 test but will provide you some guidance on whether or not you need to quarantine during that period. The tests are administered in De Simone Gym in the SAC on the Parkside campus Monday-Thursday, 9 am - 5 pm, and Friday, 9 am - 1 pm. Testing is expected to last at least several weeks.
