

US Supreme Court Hears Arguments for, against Biden's Student Debt Forgiveness

This week, the United States Supreme Court heard oral arguments from both sides in two lawsuits challenging the constitutionality of President Joe Biden's student debt forgiveness program. The first lawsuit was brought by six Republican-led states – Arkansas, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and South Carolina; the other was brought by a conservative advocacy organization. A decision on the cases is expected by July.

America Saves Week Highlights Importance of Planning for the Future

Today marks the final day of America Saves Week 2023. The annual event, this year held from February 27 through March 3, is a national campaign that encourages individuals and families to consider their financial stability. The state Department of Financial Institutions is taking the opportunity to encourage Wisconsinites to evaluate their personal finances and savings habits by taking the America Saves Pledge. Through the pledge, individuals complete a financial check-in that allows them to get a clear view of their finances; set savings goals; and create a plan to achieve them. "Empty Bowls" Fundraiser to Fight Food Insecurity

Since 1997, the Empty Bowls fundraiser in Racine has raised more than \$375,000 to fight food insecurity in the community. The annual event will take place this year on Monday, March 6, from 11 am to 2 pm and again from 4 pm to 7 pm at Festival Hall, 5 Fifth St. Carryout is available, as well. Entry is \$15, which gets you a bowl made by local students, churchgoers and community members, which you get to keep. You also get to choose from 12 different soups – or try a little of all of them – with bread and other baked goods. Children get a disposable bowl for \$5, and carryouts are \$10. A number of businesses and community organizations have chipped in to donate soups and baked goods; you'll find a comprehensive list at emptybowlsracine.org.



Taxpayer Bill for Vos/Gableman/Trump Election "Investigation" Continues to Grow

The farce that was the "investigation" into the 2020 Presidential Election, conducted by former state Supreme Court Justice Michael Gableman and authorized by Assembly Speaker Robin Vos (R-Rochester), may be over, but the cost to taxpayers continues to grow. This week, a judge ordered Vos (i.e., taxpayers) to pay \$135,574 in legal fees to watchdog group American Oversight. The group had been successful in a suit to obtain records from the Gableman "review". This latest order brings the cost to taxpayers to \$2.5 million.

The Gableman probe was a joke from the start, as former President Donald Trump pressured and shamed Vos into authorizing it. Gableman's "work" revealed no evidence of voter fraud.

Additionally, local businesses M&K Detailing, Viper Lighting, Abi & Sons Automotive, and BLAK Coffee Kenosha have reached out to provide services to the woman. This is just another example of the greatness of our community and the people who live here.





Carthage College Will Host Special Olympics Basketball Game

Sunday, March 5, Carthage College will welcome four teams of Special Olympic athletes – about 40 in total – as it plays host to fun and unique basketball game. The teams from the Special Olympics will play against a team of Carthage College students; each team from the Special Olympics will play one quarter against the Carthage students.

This type of game has been played in the past, but Covid restrictions have paused it since 2019. The Carthage College Special Olympics Club will be selling t-shirts and holding raffles and other events, like a free throw contest at halftime. Admission is free; concessions will be available for purchase. Game time is 2 pm.



Wisconsin Families Can Now Get Ten (10) Free Covid Tests Each Month

Wisconsin residents can now get up to 10 free Covid-19 testing kits sent straight to their doors each month as part of the Wisconsin Department of Health Services' Say Yes! Covid Test Program. Since starting in September 2022, the <u>Say Yes! Covid Test</u> program has delivered more than 1.6 million free test kits throughout Wisconsin. Households were previously limited to one free test kit (5 tests) per month but can now receive two, containing 10 tests. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has extended the shelf life for several Covid tests, including iHealth, which are delivered through the Say Yes! Covid Test program; tests are now good for up to one year. To order the test kits online, visit sayyescovidhometest.org.
