Kenosha Teen Recognized as "State Youth of the Year" by Boys & Girls Club of Wisconsin






Touring Bridges Community Center

Bridges is a consumer-run, non-profit organization dedicated to the recovery and support of adults living with a mental illness, co-occurring challenges such as mental illness and drug/alcohol use. It is open to members of the community. The goal of Bridges is to partner with individuals in their recovery by giving peer support, encouragement, hope, a sense of self-worth, education,

Wisconsin Families Can Now Get Ten (10) Free Covid Tests Each Month

Wisconsin residents can now get up to 10 free Covid-19 testing kits sent straight to their doors each month as part of the Wisconsin Department of Health Services' Say Yes! Covid Test Program. Since starting in September 2022, the Say Yes! Covid Test program has delivered more than 1.6 million free test kits throughout Wisconsin. Households were previously limited to one free test kit (5 tests) per month but can now receive two, containing 10 tests. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has extended the shelf life for several Covid tests, including iHealth, which are delivered through the Say Yes! Covid Test program; tests are now good for up to one year. To order the test kits online, visit sayyescovidhometest.org.
