
Dear friends,

Finance Committee Takes First Budget Votes as Republicans Unveil Local Government Funding Plan

This week, the Legislature's Joint Finance Committee (JFC) met on both Tuesday and Thursday to begin crafting their version of the 2023 State Budget proposal. Budget votes got off to a discouraging start, as the Committee's Republican majority voted to strip out 545 items that Governor Evers had included in his proposal, such as paid family leave; BadgerCare expansion; automatic voter registration; a homeless veteran rental assistance program; a family caregiver tax credit; expansion of both the Earned Income Tax and Homestead Tax Credits; funds for mental health and suicide prevention programs; clean water initiatives; and much more. Also on Tuesday, Republicans released details on their plan to increase shared revenue to counties and municipalities. The plan would provide at least a 10% increase in shared revenue to towns, villages, cities and counties and allow the City of Milwaukee and Milwaukee County to ask voters to approve local sales tax increases to pay off their unfunded pension liabilities and avoid

bankruptcy. The additional money comes with strings attached, however. In both the City of Milwaukee and Milwaukee County, any future budget action would require a 2/3 vote of their governing body (City Council, County Board), rather than a simple majority; Milwaukee Public Schools would have to accept 25 school resource officers at schools throughout the district; and the way members of Milwaukee's Police and Fire Commission would be altered, among other new requirements. Statewide, the bill prohibits local advisory referendums, such as those many communities have held in recent years on fair maps, BadgerCare expansion, legalized marijuana, and, in Kenosha, the casino project. Communities would also be held to a new "maintenance of effort" requirement for public safety, meaning the percentage of their total budgets they spend on public safety can never dip below current levels without penalty. It remains to be seen if Republicans have the votes to pass the bill in its current form. It is likely that some changes will be made to the bill, as Republicans in the Assembly and Senate work out their differences, and Governor Evers said on Thursday he will likely veto the bill if it passes in its current form. Former Kenosha County Exec Kreuser Appointed to UW Board of Regents

Kenosha's Jim Kreuser, former County Executive and Assembly Minority Leader, has been appointed by Governor Tony Evers to serve on the UW System Board of Regents. Kreuser will serve a seven-year term ending in 2030. The Board of Regents has 18 members and sets policy and rules for UW System schools, approves member schools' budgets, sets admissions standards, and grants tenure to faculty members.

Immigrant rights advocates marched to the State Capitol on Tuesday and held a protest as the Republican majority on the Joint Finance Committee (JFC) voted to strip out 545 provisions from Governor Tony Evers's budget proposal, including drivers' licenses for undocumented immigrants.



Kurklis Wins 2023 Connie Reyes Award for Child Advocacy

Kim Kurklis, retired Early Childhood Special Education Diagnostician for KUSD, has received the 2023 Connie Reyes Award for Excellence in Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention. The award is named in honor of Connie Reyes, a Kenosha County social worker who worked with families that had dealt with child abuse and neglect; Reyes was murdered in 1990 by a woman who had lost her three children due to neglect and abuse, along with her accomplices. Kim Kurklis worked in child abuse and neglect prevention for nearly 40 years. She is a native of Kenosha.



Showing Appreciation for Our Teachers

No matter how hard we try, we can never thank teachers enough for all that they do to help our children grow and develop. Tuesday, May 2, was National Teacher Appreciation Day. The National Education Association (NEA) describes National Teacher Appreciation Day as "a day

Wisconsin Families Can Now Get Ten (10) Free Covid Tests Each Month

Wisconsin residents can now get up to 10 free Covid-19 testing kits sent straight to their doors each month as part of the Wisconsin Department of Health Services' Say Yes! Covid Test Program. Since starting in September 2022, the Say Yes! Covid Test program has delivered more than 1.6 million free test kits throughout Wisconsin. Households were previously limited to one free test kit (5 tests) per month but can now receive two, containing 10 tests. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has extended the shelf life for several Covid tests, including iHealth, which are delivered through the Say Yes! Covid Test program; tests are now good for up to one year. To order the test kits online, visit sayyescovidhometest.org.
