# Governor, Republican Leaders Reach Deal on Local Government Funding Bill and Other Budget Issues

A stalemate lasting a couple of weeks seems to be over, as Governor Tony Evers and Republican leaders in the Legislature announced that they had reached an agreement on a major priority, a bill to increase state aid to local governments. The major sticking point had been the provisions related to the City of Milwaukee and Milwaukee County. Both entities are facing impending financial crises stemming from decades-old pension obligations. That has now been resolved, in a package that also includes agreement on education funding. Details of the deal that have been released include:

• The requirement that the City of Milwaukee and Milwaukee County could institute sales tax increases if approved by voters through referendum was removed; that had been a major sticking point for Senate Republicans and Governor Evers. Instead, the new sales taxes can be enacted if 2/3 of the Milwaukee City Council and Milwaukee County Board approve.

- Every municipality and county in the state will receive at least a 20% increase in shared revenue. This is an increase from 10% in the original bill and 15% in the bill passed a couple of weeks back by the State Assembly.
  - More than \$1 billion in new money for K-12 education
    - \$50 million for reading and literacy programs
      - \$97 million more for special education
      - \$30 million more for school mental health
- A per-pupil increase in state funding for voucher schools and students in the special needs scholarship program.

As with any compromise, no one is going to be happy with every part of the deal. In divided government, compromise is necessary in order to get something done. Details are still coming out, so we don't have the full picture yet. We will see if this deal has the support it needs to pass once more detailed information is made available.



### Schedule of Local Juneteenth Celebrations

Each year, June 19 is recognized as Juneteenth, also known as "Freedom Day". It is the oldest-known celebration marking the end of slavery in the United States and was recently made a federal holiday. In next week's edition, I'll talk more about the history of Juneteenth. ### Racine, Kenosha Receive State Violence Prevention Grants

Racine and Kenosha were among the communities awarded violence prevention grants through the Wisconsin Community Safety Fund (WCSF). The grants can be used for a wide range of programs and initiatives intended to address increased levels of gun violence, suicide and domestic violence since the start of the Covid pandemic.

The City of Kenosha will use the grant to establish the Key Emerging Leaders Academy to engage youth at highest risk for experiencing and engaging in community violence. The City of Racine's plans for the grant include an Office of Violence Prevention and a gun violence intervention plan.
