Large crowds punctuated events throughout the 52nd Annual Tobacco Heritage Days, attracted by scores of events for children, outdoor music fans, car enthusiasts and America's favorite sports baseball and softball games at Racetrack Park.

The weekend of activities was capped by a nostalgic hometown parade Sunday featuring the city's youngest and oldest generations.

Scores of kids marched from the park to the downtown in colorful outfits, and veterans rode atop a float.

Downtown Edgerton turned into a vintage auto museum Saturday during the 46th annual Car and Truck show linked to Tobacco Heritage

With newly paved N. Henry St. and Canal St. open for traffic, the business district went full throttle in featuring nearly 200 cars from the "good-old" days of automotive and truck manufacturing.

Shiny Thunderbirds, classic Chevy models from 1967, heavy-duty Buicks, classy Corvettes and the post World War II Fords of the late 1940s and early 1950s were among the models featured along W. Fulton St. from Main St. to

Albion St. at City Hall. Flared wing models and vehicles with sparkling grills and bumpers from the 1950s, 1960s and 1970s were showcased.

Added to the delight of auto buffs were music and an old-fashioned ice cream and pie sale at the Depot.

The colorful display of vintage autos included models from the Bonnie and Clyde era of bank heists and other vehicles still running from pre-depression days in the 1930s and rarely seen any more on highways and byways except at local car shows.

The car show was one of the annual highlights for Edgerton as a tourist attraction under the city's new Visit Edgerton

Stricker keeps rolling along

Steve Stricker has become a ikeness of the Energy Bunny.

The Edgerton native keeps hop, hop, hopping through the PGA Tour Champions golf series with top finishes, including another major first place Sunday at the Firestone Country Club in Akron, Ohio.

Although he finished a disappointing second earlier this month at the U.S. Senior Open in Stevens Point, Stricker was back on top of his game at the Kaulig Companies Championship in Akron, where he finished second last year to Madison rival Jerry Kelley.

Playing a consistent game on the greens with frequent putts for birdies, Stricker captured his fifth senior championship of the season and continues atop the Charles Schwab Cup money

Social media buffs who follow Stricker's success on the links had one word for Stricker's continued success - "again, again and again."

Sunday's triumph netted Stricker a prize purse of \$525,000, his largest payoff of the season in the lead up to the Charles Schwab Cup in

Stricker entered Sunday's final fourth round of the Kaulig tournament tied with Harrison Frazar at 7 under, 203.

As Frazar faded late in the stretch, Stricker sank a 40-foot putt on the 15th hole to lift his game after a bogey on the 14th.

Stricker, 56, finished 11 under at 269 with rounds of 65-73-65-and 66.

David Toms finished three strokes back for second at 272.

Frazar, Ernie Els and K. J. Choi all tied at 7 under at 273.

The win at Akron was Stricker's third major PGA Tour Champions title this season, having won the Regions Tradition and the Kitchen Aid Senior PGA Champions, both

the U.S. Senior event at Stevens Players Championship at Ponte Point, finished sixth at 5 under. Vedra Beach, Fla. Langer is second in the Charles Schwab Cup race and Toms third, but both are far back in winnings.

Striker said he was excited about the outcome of the championship in Akron because it qualified him for next year's

He called the Kailua a special event for him.

"This is a special tournament here, gets me in the Players Championship next year, which is another goal of mine this year, to go back there and play again."

Ohio. It was Stricker's fifth win of the season and his third major championship on the Senior Circuit.

The state of marijuana legislation in the State of Wisconsin

As of March 2023, with the medical use of marijuana, or cannabis, now legalized in 40 states and its recreational use legalized in 23 states, our readers have asked for clarification of the state of marijuana legislation in the State of Wisconsin, considering that our state hasn't yet legislated either medical or recreational usage.

Federal marijuana law

In the United States, enactment of the Controlled Substances Act of 1970 (CSA) made the use and possession of marijuana illegal under federal law for any purpose. The CSA classified marijuana as a Schedule I substance, determined to have a high potential for abuse and with no accepted

Some cannabis-derived compounds have been approved


by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for prescription use, like Marinol (THC), Syndros (THC), Cesamet (nabilone), and Epidiolex (CBD). For non-prescription use, CBD, delta-8 THC, and other naturally-occurring cannabinoids derived from industrial hemp are legal and unregulated at the federal level, but legality and enforcement varies by state Despite the CSA and based on

accumulated scientific evidence, most states have parted company with federal policy and have legalized marijuana for either or both its medical and/or recreational use.

Medical marijuana legislation within states

As noted, the medical use of cannabis is legal with a medical recommendation in 40 states. Its medical use is, also, legally allowed in four out of five perma-
